Winter School outline

The theme of the 2024 Winter School is Strategic Foresight and Interaction. The Winter School lasts 3 days and provides local regional development experts, development agency staff, national and regional policy makers, with knowledge of practices, experiences, trends and challenges in regional development and innovation. This objective will be achieved thanks to discussions between the participants and regional development experts, analysts from the OECD, regional or local development agencies, European institutions as well as thanks to site visits.

Winter School 2024 objectives

The Winter School seeks to:

- Establish fruitful links between interregional actors active in regional innovation:
- Provide an introduction to the innovation ecosystem of the East Netherlands and the Utrecht region;
- Provide an insight into the Dutch regional development agencies, which act as a gateway for cooperation with the entire innovation ecosystem in the Netherlands;
- Enlighten the public with practical examples of how to implement policies for regional innovation;
- Promote networking and knowledge exchange on relevant case studies and good practices from in regional development from the East Netherlands, OECD, European Commission-Joint Research Centre and other invited stakeholders:
- Raise awareness of strategic foresight among territorial and economic development actors and introduce methodological methods and tools to

anticipate potential future challenges and opportunities in regional development.

Background

In 2023, EURADA organised the first edition of the Winter School in close cooperation with the OECD Trento Centre for Local Development. This year, the two organisations are supported by the Region of East Netherlands and the Region of Utrecht, both proud Dutch EURADA members.

2024 Focus

The focus of the 2024 Winter School will be on the role of regions and regional development agencies in addressing socio-economic challenges and megatrends. This will be done by concentrating on foresight and interaction.

Methodology

During the Winter School participants will be able to take part in **interactive** sessions on the topics of **Strategic Foresight**, **Strategic Autonomy**, **Green and Digital Transition**. Taking into account the missions and core activities of RDAs, namely innovation support, investment and internationalisation, as well as the specificities of different innovation ecosystems, the participants will explore the future opportunities and challenges that lie ahead for RDAs

Fee, logistics and costs

There is a participation fee for the Winter School. The organisers will cover transport, lunches, and dinner during the Winter School, whereas travel to Utrecht and accommodation costs will be borne by the participants.

The programme of the Winter School targets **officers working for national and regional Development Agencies** and or students or other professionals interested and active in socio economic development. **Participants should be strongly committed to local development, innovation and/or development and implementation of EU R&I and/or Cohesion policy**.

Candidates need to submit duly compiled <u>application via this form</u> online **by 21 January 2024**.

Candidates can propose a **topic for a pitch** on a theme of the Winter School.

Notification of selected participants by 4 February 2024. Priority will be given to members of the EURADA. If the number of applications exceeds the number of available places, the participants will be selected on the basis of professional attainment and work experience.

All sessions will be conducted in English.

The residential Winter School will take place from 26 to 29 February 2024 in Utrecht, Netherlands, and will include a study visit to the East Netherlands.
