

KEY ELEMENTS OF TRANSITION PATHWAY CO-IMPLEMENTATION

- 1. Commitment by stakeholders
- 2. Communication and outreach
- 3. Mutual inspiration among stakeholders (sharing of best-practices)
- 4. Progress monitoring and assessment

TOGETHER FOR THE EU MOBILITY ECOSYSTEM!



1. STAKEHOLDERS' COMMITMENT

- Stakeholders shaped the form of the transition pathway and continue shaping its co-implementation through their concrete actions (pledges)
- Stakeholders will be reflecting on what actions they can (or have already been)
 put(ting) in place to align with shared transition pathway ambitions
- Stakeholders who can make and submit a pledge include individual companies, business associations, social partners, NGOs, local authorities (regions!), and others



1. COMMITMENT FROM REGIONS!

- Regional administrations develop local strategies to accompany the transformation of the mobility ecosystem
- Including, for instance, re- up-skilling programs, funding programs, public transport, railways, charging, alternative fuel and cycling infrastructures, etc.

2. COMMUNICATION AND OUTREACH

- The European Commission will soon open an **online call**, inviting all stakeholders to submit pledges (launch due by Q1 2024)
- The European Commission will be gathering those pledges and make them publicly available online



3. MUTUAL INSPIRATION

- Pledges demonstrate leadership and good examples in the twin transition of the mobility industrial ecosystem
- Stakeholders will be able to see other stakeholders' pledges (competitors, suppliers, customers, etc.) and be inspired
- This will allow them to check if and when a certain type of action is becoming a pattern ("best practice") within a certain industry or across the entire ecosystem
- It will help companies (especially SMEs) make more informed investment decisions, and reduce risk of stranded assets
- Being active and visible in the co-implementation exercise will make it easier for stakeholders (including MSs and local authorities) to establish new synergies and reinforce existing ones



4. PROGRESS MONITORING & ASSESSMENT

- The pledges published will allow the European Commission to monitor and assess the progress made on the twin transition
- Pledges will also help recognising those areas/initiatives that could benefit from EU-level support, for instance need for further removing of regulatory barriers, need for extra funding, etc.



HOW TO CONCRETELY PREPARE AND SUBMIT A PLEDGE?

- Read through the Mobility Transition Pathway report with an open mind
- Reflect on your organisation's strategy and objectives vs. the transition pathway report
- Formulate one or more pledges, each with a) a <u>concrete action</u> b) a <u>measurable target</u> c) a <u>precise timeframe</u> d) a <u>clear link with MTP report</u> (to a specific topic or action)
 - You can also mention an action that has been started in the past and is still meant to deliver results in the future
- Submit the pledge via the website (a dedicated Transition Pathway Stakeholder Support Platform [TPSSP] to come soon!!!)
